SIAST on the fast track with applied research

SIAST faculty eligible for both NSERC and SSHRC grant funding

April 27, 2010 – SIAST's successful bid for Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) eligibility means that faculty working in the social sciences and humanities sector can now apply to an additional source of funding to support their applied research efforts.

SSHRC, the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) are collectively known as the Tri-Council. NSERC supports research in the natural sciences and engineering, and CIHR supports research in the health sciences. SIAST became eligible to apply for NSERC funding last year.

"Applied research projects have strong potential for practical learning experiences for students and their employability," says Dr. Barb Bremner, SIAST's associate vice-president of Educational Services. "Adding SSHRC eligibility to SIAST's research capabilities will provide new opportunities for faculty to develop research projects that will benefit the people of Saskatchewan and contribute to economic development in the province."

At SIAST, applied research focuses on finding solutions for practical problems.

Research in the social sciences and humanities advances knowledge and understanding about individuals, groups and societies. SSHRC grants and fellowships are awarded through an independent, national, peer-review process. Submissions are reviewed by volunteer selection committees that recommend to SSHRC which projects to fund. To help the review committees with their decision making, an additional 5,200 experts are available to provide written assessments of selected proposals. SSHRC adjudication committees and expert proposal evaluators include scholars from outside Canada.

SIAST's goal is to become one of the leaders in applied research among Canadian colleges and institutes of technology, with an emphasis on sharing benefits with local
