Detailed Narrative Description of Project and Services Provided:

Project Goal: To support the sustainable economoic and social development of both aboriginal and non-aboriginal communities in Panama through an increased capacity to identify and address local human resource needs.

Project Objectives: To support the development of a Rural Development Center within the City of Knowledge to meet the technical and pedagogic training needs of rural extension trainers and their client communities.

Technical assistance and training activities were provided which included the following:

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- Liaison with Indigenous Council of Panama (COONAPIP) and Ngobe-Bugle Indigenous Council to review project parameters;
- Consultation with government and non-government agencies related to Indigenous Affairs to provide overview of project parameters and to seek out partnerships;
- Review of other aid projects involving indigenous peoples identifying factors for effectiveness and gaps and weaknesses;
- Rural needs assessment techniques developed using participatory methodology;
- Needs assessment conducted in Ngobe-Bugle Comarca (reserve) related to identified sectors for rural extension training: eco-tourism, small business and marketing; crafts production/marketing and organic agriculture;
- Training for indigenous project support personnel to assist with project implementation;
- In-Canada study tour for four indigenous leaders related to cultural and educational policies;
- Training in organic agricultural practices for agricultural trainer;
- Identification of gender expert within Ngobe community; development of gender sensitivity training materials for master trainers;
- Development of training manuals for rural extension workers: Adult Education Techniques; Gender Sensitivity; Organic Agriculture; Small business/marketing; Crafts Marketing;
- Trainer selection criteria developed, trainers selected (5; 2 female) and trained;
- Pilot community selection criteria developed, pilot communities selected;
- Pilot training courses offered in pilot communities using trained trainers;
- Liaison with various government departments and agencies related to various programs for indigenous peoples;
- Rural Development Office at City of Knowledge houses project and staff;
- Development of funding arrangements with other government agencies to continue the work that was started with this project within the Ngobe-Bugle Comarca;

Results

- 1. Extension workers are able to systematically assess rural needs
- 2. Extension workers improve technical and teaching skills
